Alumni Scholarship Winner Update – Dr. Josie Bowen

Last week I found myself in Raleigh with my mother and siblings, Anna Gunn (Bowen) Murray '94 and Will Bowen '95, for a quick overnight visit from Charlotte. After wandering through my typical afternoon haunts of Five Points, Logans and Cameron Village, and in efforts to avoid the perpetual construction on Capital Blvd. laden with our new state flower, the orange and white striped barrel, I headed to mom's via Peace Street instead. In that nostalgic way most of us do, my internal monologue took note of the Starbucks, the long-standing old convenience store and especially Fallons given that Queen of Hearts had just occurred only a few weeks prior. Driving past Broughton and glancing at the clock tower, my Bowen menagerie of show choir performances, sequin dresses, French class with Mr. Dubois, whom ALL the Bowen children had for a teacher, friends, teachers and the merry-go-round of high school life swirled around my head, and I smiled. Despite the immediate transposition back to those events with a glance as I am driving, the now 27 year lapse from graduation inevitably classifies me currently...as OLD.

The numbers never lie – 27 years since I graduated Broughton; 25 years since my dad died, William (Bill) C. Bowen '62, while my brother and sister were still at Broughton; 23 since UNC-Chapel Hill undergrad, 18 from UNC-Chapel Hill Medical School (my patients still tell me I look too young to be a doctor), and now practicing Emergency Medicine in Charlotte for my 12th year since

completion of residency training. That's a long time. Those years condense transiently, when I scroll through my Broughton Facebook friends, until I see all of their own kids in high school and college. Yes, we are really all that age.

In my busy hospital, Novant Health Presbyterian, we always have a myriad of students shadowing, rotating or visiting for any number of reasons. I am reminded of the wide-eyed student I once was and how the gifts of time and exposure to medi-

cine at a young age by local renowned legends of their field. Dr. George Paschal, Dr. Joseph Archie and Dr. J. Tift Mann '60, made such an indelible mark on my decision to pursue medical school.

As the 1992 recipient of the Broughton Alumni Scholarship... YOUR gifts of time, talent and certainly financial support enabled a burgeoning student to have the opportunity and exposure to pursue her dreams of medicine while assisting with the financial burdens of college. Your impact was and continues to be huge. The opportunity to participate in summer research projects with Wake Heart Associates in Raleigh, travel to Jamaica for medical missions and volunteer with local medical clinics, just to name a few, became possible because of your scholarship support. Thank you all so very much for ways in which your alumni support changes lives, as it certainly changed mine.

The practice of emergency medicine and the ER itself is such a unique intersection

Broughton student organizes Battle of the Bands fundraiser to benefit brain health

A sophomore at Broughton High School was behind a battle of the bands fundraising event in March that was inspired, in part, by her grandfather. Charlotte Fullbright organized "Maintain Your Brain Battle of the Bands" from 1:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m., March 23, on the front lawn of Broughton High School. The community event featured student performers from high schools across Wake County. The winning band, The Buzzards Band comprised of Holly Springs High School students, received the honor of opening for a headliner at Raleigh's Lincoln Theatre.

The event also raised money for the "Triangle Aphasia Project", which supports the families of and people with aphasia, which is the loss of the ability to understand or express speech.

"Neurological health is an issue that affects people of all ages and the goal of this event is to increase awareness and raise funds for brain health issues," Fullbright said.

The issue is close to Fullbright's heart.

"With my Granddaddy affected by a brain hemorrhagic

stroke, and a history of dementia on both sides of my family, I have a personal connection to the subject of neurological health," according to Fullbright, who also is a varsity volleyball player at Broughton. "As an athlete, I am well aware of the increased focus on prevention and treatment of concussions and traumatic brain injury. I want to do something to help."

Fullbright has rallied much of the community behind her cause. The afternoon included the bands-style competition along with food trucks and informational booths. High school students from Broughton, Cary Academy, Apex, Cardinal Gibbons, the Wake Men's Leadership Academy, Sander-son, Millbrook and elsewhere publicized the event.



Legacy of slain Cap lives on



More than four years have passed since Deah Barakat, his wife Yusor Abu-Salha, and her younger sister Razan were killed in their apartment in Chapel Hill one day after Valentine's Day 2015, but the legacy of giving the young people exemplified lives on without them. Deah graduated from Broughton in 2009.

Shortly after the killings in 2015, the first Interfaith Food Drive was organized to benefit the Food Bank of Central and Eastern North Carolina and raised enough to provide 21,000 meals. Members of Christian, Muslim and Jewish congregations from across the Triangle worked to pack and sort food for the fifth food drive to honor Deah, Yusor and Razan held March 2, 2019. The drive raised enough for 67,000 meals, which broke the previous year's record by 10,000 meals.

"The sense of unity and the urgency to act that came in the aftermath of the Chapel Hill shootings brought a lot of people together and allowed us to impact many lives," said Farris Barakat, Deah's brother and 2008 Broughton graduate. "This was one of the ways that we've been able to continue to do that."

The latest food drive was hosted by the Light House Project, a nonprofit dedicated to empowering Muslim youth throughout the Triangle in collaboration with the N.C. State College of Design and the UNC School of Dentistry.

Zainab Baloch, a childhood friend of the slain students, looks at the food drive as a way to continue their legacy rather than simply remember them.

"We choose to express our pain through service," Baloch said.

Deah Barakat was studying at the UNC School of Dentistry, where his wife Yusor was about to start classes. Yusor's sister Razan studied at the College of Design. But none of them let their busy schedules get in the way of intentionally serving the Triangle community, said Shadi Sadi, a friend to all three.

Deah's last post on Facebook was of his and Yusor's work volunteering with the homeless in Durham, and Sadi remembers how Razan would spend her Friday nights preparing food to give to people in downtown Raleigh.

"How many college students do you know that do that?" Sadi said. "There was something extra about these people, that they were making a choice to not stay stagnant."

A neighbor, Chris Hicks who allegedly shot the three young people over a parking dispute, awaits trial in Durham, now more than four years since the slayings.

In a statement released this month, Durham County District Attorney Satana Deberry said she has "committed the new Durham District Attorney's Office to prioritizing the prosecution of violent crimes."

"I am committed to an efficient and just resolution for all of Durham's violent crimes," Deberry said in the statement. "This case is now one of the oldest pending homicides in Durham. I am working to resolve litigation and progress this case towards trial. My heart is with the Abu-Salha and Barakat families on the fourth anniversary of the tragic murder of three wonderful young people. The loss of Deah, Yusor and Razan has left a great hole in our community."

The food drive is a way for the community to remember the three as they lived, not as they died. It continues their commitment to service and giving. Now in their absence, it serves as a pathway for different local communities of faith to follow towards working together.
