Our Broughton family lost another servant recently when Sally Hayes Stevens ('58) passed away following a long battle with Alzheimer's. Sal, (her childhood nickname), was a Raleigh native, loyal Cap, and graduate of Peace College. A retired human resources director for the NC Electric Membership Corporation, Sally earned the admiration and respect of all who knew her.

Sally was a proud member of the last Broughton class that attended the school for grades eight through twelve. Her dear friend and classmate, Jane Jordan Hubbard ('58), told me the class was very close, and Sal was a major reason. "Sally was kind, friendly, and outgoing. Everybody loved her. She was the life of the party." At Broughton, Sally was involved in many aspects of student life. She was a cheerleader; a home room officer; a Hi-Times editor; a member of the Latipac staff, the Y-Teens, the band and the chorus; and she was on the Queen of Hearts Court. The '58 Latipac noted she had "personality plus"!

Sally was a tireless worker for our community and school. She was active in many charitable events and served as President of the Junior Women's Club of Raleigh, an

organization dedicated to community improvement by enhancing lives through leadership opportunities and volunteer service. Since the early days of our alumni association, Sally volunteered to help with various tasks and served in several capacities. She believed it was important to keep members of each class connected, keep the classes connected to the school, and support current students. For years

she assisted with the alumni scholarship program. She served as an agent for the class of 1958 and helped with reunion planning. She took notes at meetings. She picked up and sorted mail; endorsed checks and made deposits; recorded contributions, memorial donations, and passings; wrote thank-you notes; and responded to requests for information. Randy Worth ('64) once described Sally as being responsible for "reviewing and processing all responses to our newsletter." With a cheerful demeanor, Sally handled much of the business of the association. As the alumni association grew, tasks evolved over time. But we continue to rely on many accounting and secretarial practices Sally implemented.

FOCUS ON BROUGHTON'S MAJORETTES



Broughton's majorettes have long been a vibrant and integral component of the high school marching band, contributing flair, precision, and showmanship to the musical performances. Rooted in a tradition that dates back decades, Broughton's majorettes have evolved from simple baton twirlers to skilled performers who enhance the visual spectacle of marching band productions. Understanding the history and contemporary role of band majorettes sheds light on their significance within the broader context of high school musical culture.

MEET THE CAPS' STANDOUT GUARD

In February 2024, Broughton's 6'4" 175 pound freshman shooting guard, Jordan Page, was invited to join USA Basketball. Page was also selected for the 2024 men's Junior National minicamp, along with 63 other athletes.

He's a long and wiry southpaw that can impact the game on both ends and has been putting up numbers that are very impressive for a prospect his age.

He's at his best getting to the rim but he can also pull-up and hit shots from mid-range while also snagging boards and has upside on defense.

"I usually am getting rebounds and taking it to the rack," Page described of his own game. "I can get to my mid-range game and shoot threes."

Despite being an impactful downhill guard who can score 18-feet and in, he knows what the next step is in his development.

"I am working on my jumpshot and calming down when I dribble," he said.

Page comes from a basketball family as his father played at Shaw University, a local Division II school in Raleigh, and his mother having grown up playing in South Carolina. Page is looking to be the first Division I player in his family and certainly seems to be on track for that if the work and production persist.

Being a freshman that is just now emerging, Page hasn't received any offers but is projecting as a high major prospect. His two dream schools are Duke and Kentucky.

Why he has our attention.

While at the John Wall Holiday Invitational, one of the top events in the nation that brings in loads of local and regional talent, Page proved to be one of the top freshmen in attendance.

In a game in front of 247Sports where his Broughton team took on The Cannon School featuring a high major senior, a high major junior and another projected high major freshman, Page shined.

His team was heavily outmatched but Page competed and didn't back down. He kept his foot on the gas all night and ended up posting 20-points, seven rebounds, two assists, two steals and had just one turnover all night, shooting 7-of-16 from the field (0-of-3 from three) and getting to the line ten times.

It's early, but with his physical tools, the upside in his frame as he continues to mature and his foundation as a slasher, mid-range shooter and the instincts he shows, he has plenty to build on to become a national level recruit.

CAP HONORED WITH SCHOLARSHIP, PROFESSORSHIP



When Cree, Inc. was started, each of the six founders had a role. Broughton grad, John Palmour's was to work on advanced devices.

Palmour stayed involved with Cree, now Wolfspeed, as long as any of the founders. When he passed away in November 2022 at the age of 62, he was serving as the company's chief technology officer and had been a driving force behind Cree's transition from an LED lighting manufacturer to a silicon carbide power semiconductor company.

"This was JP's baby," said John Edmond, a fellow co-founder of Cree and NC State engineering alumnus. "It's sad to lose such a great friend, but also to have him not see where this thing is going. He was the heart and soul of that business."

Wolfspeed's new manufacturing facility under construction in Chatham County will be named the John Palmour

Manufacturing Center for Silicon Carbide. The company has also honored Palmour's legacy while investing in future leaders and discoveries and adding to the Palmour family's legacy of philanthropy at NC State. A gift to the University by the company has established the John Palmour Distinguished Professorship in Materials Science and Engineering (MSE) as well as the Wolfspeed Endowed Scholarship in memory of Dr. John Palmour. The scholarship will provide need-based support for undergraduates in MSE, where Palmour earned his bachelor's degree (1982) and Ph.D. (1988).

Palmour and his wife, Nancy Palmour, a 1985 alumna of the NCSU College of Humanities and Social Sciences, had previously established the Palmour Family College of Engineering Fellowship Endowment and the Palmour Family Extraordinary Opportunity Scholarship Endowment for engineering students. They also have been generous supporters of the University's Greatest Needs Fund and the Wolfpack Club's Student-Athlete ImPack Program.

A member of the National Academy of Engineering, Palmour was a strong advocate for research collaborations between industry, faculty members and students. He played a key role in helping bring the PowerAmerica research center to NC State, served two terms on the University's Board of Visitors and participated in activities such as a 2022 panel discussion about the College of Engineering's role in driving the state's economy, held at James B. Hunt Jr. Library.

Palmour was named a Distinguished Engineering Alumnus by the College of Engineering in 2009. In 2015, he was elected to the inaugural class of the MSE's Hall of Fame, along with his father, Hayne Palmour III, a 37-year professor of ceramic engineering at the University and an NC State alumnus himself.
